(2.) Felt, in commerce; (§ 1, def. 1.) is a fort of fluff deriving all its confiftence merely from being fulled, or wrought with less and fize, without either fpinning or weaving. Felt is made either of wool alone; or of wool and hair. Those of French manufacture, 3½ yards long, and 1½ broad, for cloaks, pay each 21, 148, 14d, on importation; and draw back 11, 128, 3d, on exporting them again.
