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




Fig. 1 An Arabic Hexagon (Plate VII, from Bourgoin, J. "Arabic Geometrical Pattern and Design." Dover Publications, 1973.)








Fig. 4 The same as Fig. 3 with unused lines removed




Fig. 5 The lines of Fig. 4 softened by curving them slightly.



a stylized flower






Fig. 8 A needlepoint fan worked from the design of Fig. 7
