## Flax Manufacture in the United States.

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It is somewhat curious that some carnest attention is not given to the establishment of the linen manufacture in the United States, which, in its present condition, does not begin to supply our requirements, as the accompanying figures will exhibit: The imports of manufactured flax into the United States from 1871 to 1881 amounted to \$1277,47,371, or nearly \$18,000,000 per annum. The importation of linen in 1883 was as follows:

We now manufacture cotton, wool, worsted and silk fabrics in enormous quantities, and of quality certainly not inferior to the best made abroad; but though we convert many tons of flax yearly in making cordage, carpet yarns, threads and coarse cloth, we make no fine linens, shirting, sheeting, toilet or table linens. table linens.

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We have good authority for the statement that we can, and do, grow flax in this country of as good quality for the purpose of making fine linen fabrics as the best from any part of the world; and there is apparently no insuperable difficulty in the way of our introducing and successfully establishing this branch of manufacture to supply our domestic needs. This is a subject which our capitalists have apparently overlooked.
