HENEQUEN, hen'e-ken; Mex. Sp. hen'e-ken'. The Mexican name of the plant Agave fourcroydes and of the fibre produced from its leaves. The plant closely resembles the maguey plant (A. cantala) and the true sisal plant (A. sisalana) (see Hemp, Sisal), but its fibre, largely used in making binder twine, is not quite so valuable as the fibre of these two species. Henequen is a native of Mexico, where it is largely cultivated, particularly in Yucatan. The plant lives from 15 to 25 years. The stems when mature range from about 2 to 5 feet in height. The fibre, from 3 to 5 feet long, is commercially known as sisal, or Mexican sisal, although the term "sisal" is considered more appropriately applied to the fibre of A. sisalana. Mexico exports about 120,000 tons of henequen fibre annually.
