TAR'TAN (possibly Fr. tiretaine, tirtaine, linsey-woolsey, from Sp. tiritaña, thin silk or woolen cloth). A well-known cloth of checkered pattern, also called plaid. The Scottish Gaelic tartan is a loan word from the English; the native name is rather breacan. These colored plaids have long been in great favor in the Highlands of Scotland, where each clan has its distinctive pattern.
