CANVAS, or Canvass, in Commerce, a coarse fort of linen or hempen cloth, usually woven open, and regularly, in little squares; serving for divers domestic purposes, and especially for the ground of tapestry work and painting.

We have divers forts and denominations of canvas, most

We have divers forts and denominations of canvas, most of them imported from abroad; as Dutch, Barras, and Hessian canvas; packing canvas; guttings and spruce canvas; poledavies, ebbing, or Queensbrough canvas; working canvas, for botts or cushions, narrow, broad, and broadest.

Canvas also is the cloth on which painters usually draw their pictures; the canvas being smoothed over with a slick-stone, then fized, and afterwards whited over, makes what the painters call their primed cloth, on which they draw their first sketches with a goal or chalk, and afterwards finish with colours.

CANVAS is also a name sometimes given to fail cloth.
