Can'vas, n. [Fr. canevas: Lat. cannabis, hemp.] A coarse, unbleached cloth made of hemp or flax, chiefly used to make sails for shipping, tents, &c.—Also, a light material woven with the warp and woof at intervals, so as to leave square interstices between them, and used by ladies for tapestry and Berlin-wool work.—Painter's canvas, on the contrary, is a material of very close texture, called "ticking." It is generally purchased stretched on frames of various sizes, and primed with a light neutral gray or drab tint ready for use.

(Naul.) The sails of a ship, taken generally.

"Set every stitch of canvas to woo the freshening wind." Mackay.—a. Made of canvas: as, a canvas awning.
