Mungo, n. (Manuf.) A term applied to woollen cloth manufactured from old wool obtained from the rigs of heavy fabrics, the rags being torn into fibre by cylindrical machines armed with teeth. This cloth gives substance and warmth, and is capable of a fine finish, but from the shortness of the fibre is weak and tender. It is chiefly used for padding, linings, office-coats, druggets and blankets. Broadcloth is sometimes made with a large admixture of this cheap and inferior material.
