Wool-weight, (-wāt.) (Camb.) Bales of wool vary in weight according to the custom of the country where they are packed and whence they are exported. Thus, in the U. States, England, and the English colonies, the pound avoirdupois is the current weight; in S. America, the arroba; and in Russia, the pood. In the English trade, however, there are weights used in excess of the lb., as the clove (7 lbs.), the stone (14 lbs.), the tod (28 lbs.), the wey (182 lbs.), the pack (240 lbs.), &c.
