

The Shuttle Craft Guild provides the complete service to handweavers, whether beginners or advanced. These services start with a course of instruction in handweaving for home study which is divided into a Basic course and a Master Weaver course for which recognized certificates are awarded upon successful completion. The sustaining organ of the Shuttle Craft Guild is the monthly HANDWEAVER'S BULLETIN which carries thorough instructions on the weaving techniques, on all types of weaving projects, articles on loom dressing and designing handwoven textiles, and recommendations of good sources of equipment, materials, weaving services and books. The PORT-FOLIO edition of the Bulletin brings the subscriber actual woven samples, photographic prints or enlargements, yarn samples and special features which pertain to the subjects taken up in the BULLETIN. The monthly STYLES sheet, printed on high quality paper tinted for indexing, punched for standard notebook, outlines a specific project each month, with photograph and full instructions from source of materials through the finishing process.

In addition to the periodical services to handweavers, the Shuttle Craft Guild publishes detailed instruction booklets on specialized subjects. The HANDWEAVER'S INSTRUCTION MANUAL is widely accepted as the basic text book for weavers, and is used by many colleges, institutions and studios, as well as individual weavers. THE INKLE WEAVE booklet is the only published instruction book on this particular type of handweaving. THE DOUBLE WEAVE booklet contains instructions for 12 different types of Double Weave for four harnesses, and 12 full-page plates of patterns which may be used for various pickup or embroidery weaves. SCOTCH TARTAN SETTS gives the directions for weaving 132 authentic Scotch plaids. The INTERPRETATION OF THE J AND R BRONSON BOOK (1817) puts the drafts for this valuable old book into modern draft form to make them useful to the present-day weaver. Further instruction booklets are in preparation.

The available back Bulletins, and the complete file of STYLES sheets (these have been published monthly since July 1950) form a treasure house of instruction, ideas, information, and directions for handweavers. All projects given in Shuttle Craft publications are the results of actual research which is carried on continuously in the Shuttle Craft Studios, and therefore are fresh, timely and do not reproduce material which has been published elsewhere.

A limited number of students are taken for individual instruction in the Shuttle Craft Guild studio, on advance arrangements. Instruction is given on all levels from beginning to advanced, and is intended particularly for handweaving teachers and for the amateur or professional weaver who wishes to acquire a thorough understanding of the craft.

Testifying to the sustained high quality and the creative contributions of the Shuttle Craft Guild are the many handweavers who have subscribed to Guild publications from the date of the Guild's origin in 1924, and retain a complete file of these publications as their most valued reference material. The Guild was founded almost 30 years ago by the "Dean of American Handweaving" Mary M. Atwater, who retired from active participation in 1946. The Guild is now owned and conducted by Mr. and Mrs. Martin Tidball (Harriet Douglas Tidball) with able assistants, and the high standards of creative work established by Mrs. Atwater have not faltered. The Guild maintains its position of leadership in the handweaving field through changing times, fashions and interests.

Membership in the Shuttle Craft Guild for any handweaver is automatic with subscription to the HANDWEAVER'S BULLETIN and STYLES sheet. Special prices and special services are offered to Guild members from time to time, and Guild members have the privilege of writing to the Guild for information and advice on weaving problems. Although the sale of yarns is one of the Guild's minor services, certain difficult-to-obtain materials including Bernat Fabri wool are stocked for resale to Guild members.
