



CLASS DESCRIPTIONS

Bring bag lunch for all-day classes. Scheduled lunch is one-half hour. All materials fees are approximate and will be collected the first day of class.

FRAME LOOM

FRAME LOOM I: THE BASICS Explore your weaving heritage on a simple, versatile loom. Students learn the basic skills while weaving a wall hanging, carrying bag, pillows, or a table runner. Learn plain weaving, patterns and textures as in Navajo weaving, Scandi navian pile weaves, and Middle Eastern rug techniques. All frame loom classes are taught on Beka, Erica, Kircher, or Schacht frame looms. Students must own or rent a loom. Bring loom, spool of cotton carpet warp, notebook, pencil, tape measure, scissors, and a #10 steel crochet hook to first class.

WEAVING TECHNIQUES OF TURKEY Learn the techniques found in oriental pile and flatwoven rugs using your frame loom. The course will include lectures (illustrated with slides and examples) on the history of oriental rugs, weaving and dyeing. Bring a frame loom warped with a two ply wool at 10 epi. Traditional colors would be dark red, dark blue, brown, white or dark grey. The instructor will provide additional yarns for wefts.

FRAME LOOM III: KROKBRAGD Krokbragd is a Norwegian threeharness bound weave that strongly resembles flamepoint bargello with very exciting design and color possibilities. It can be set up to weave easily and quickly on a rigid heddle frame loom. You will learn to design and draft, set up and weave these patterns in this one-day workshop. Bring your frame workshop. Bring your trailed loom warped with a multiple of 4, plus 1 (e.g. 60 ends +1=61 ends for a warp 12" wide at 5 epi; place left and right selvage threads in slots). Use cotton carpet warp in the size Use project you wish, at least 8' wide and 40" long. Bring 1/2" dowel as wide as your loom, one pickup stick, three shuttles, at least three colors of knitting worsted or similar weight yarn, graph paper, colored pencils and a bag lunch.

FRAME LOOM III: SWEDISH ART WEAVES Dukagang and Monk's Belt are art weaves from our Scandinavian heritage which can be woven in traditional styles or contemporary adaptations on the rigid heddle frame loom to embellish garments, table linens, or wall hangings. These inlay or embroidery weaves will add color and pattern to any plain weaving. Learn basic designing and weaving techniques. There will be slides, examples, and many patterns available. Bring looms warped at 10 epi (minimum size 10"x40") in 3/2 perle cotton, Linnay, 10/2 linen or 7/2 wool, Linnay, 10/2 linen or 7/2 wool, or similar weight yarn for both warp and weft, plus small amounts of contrasting colored yarns for supplementary pattern wefts. Bring two pickup sticks, graph paper, colored pencils and your weaving gear.

FRAME LOOM II: LACE WEAVES AND SUMMER SHIRTS

Airy summer shirts, lacy cool tops: an intermediate frame loom summertime adventure combining open work or lace weaves with a summer garment. Learn the lore of summery materials - cotton, linen, rayon, blends or even silk! Develop and begin weaving your unique garments with many sources, examples, and patterns available. Explore the techniques of lacy open work weaves on the frame loom, with appropriate finishing techniques, Bring your frame loom warped for lace sampling the first session (10 epi minimum size 10"x40") with 3/2 perle cotton, Linnay, or similar weight yarn, same color warp and weft, tape measure, pickup stick, and graph paper.



SPINNING

BEGINNING SPINNING

Learn to spin on a drop spindle and spinning wheel. Instruction covers selecting and preparing wool for spinning, care and maintenance of the spinning wheel, and an intensive session in developing good spinning techniques. Students must have a wheel in good functioning condition; a few wheels are available for rental from the Guild for use in the Guild for the duration of the class. Call the Guild office for rental details.

DYEING

NATURAL DYES I Participate in fiber preparation, mordanting, plant preparation, and dyeing using local and imported dye stuffs. Students receive at least 60 fiber samples, plus detailed records enabling them to repeat the process on their own.

DYEING WITH LICHENS
This is an exciting area of
natural dyeing in which some of
the "rules" are discarded. The
session will include a
discussion of several kinds of
lichens, special dyeing
techniques, and a short history
of lichen dyeing. Each
participant will receive a
sample of the lichens and the
fiber which will be dyed during
the session. A materials fee
will be collected.



FLOOR LOOM

FLOOR LOOM I: INTRODUCTION TO FLOOR LOOM WEAVING Learn to warp a floor loom and explore basic weaving techniques and patterns. Become familiar with weaving vocabulary, loom structure and function, and basic drafting. After weaving samplers, students will plan individual projects with guidance on how to choose suitable yarns and calculate quantities. Guild looms will be used. Be prepared to purchase yarn for the sampler at the first class or bring yarn suitable for warp. Bring scissors, tape measure, yarn needle, pencil and paper.

FLOOR LOOM II: INTERMEDIATE
FLOOR LOOM SKILLS
Develop an understanding of the
basic repertoire of loomcontrolled weaves such as block
weaves, overshot, and lace
weaves. You will learn to duplicate complex weave constructions by weaving swatches for
future reference. Guild looms
will be used. Bring scissors,
tape measure, yarn needle,
pencil, paper, 8 or 10 epi graph
paper.

DOUBLE TWO-TIE UNIT WEAVES
This threading system allows one
to weave complex-looking twills;
braided twills; double weave;
double weave and huck or twill
simultaneously; and more! About
equal time will be devoted to
drafting and weaving samples.
This class is for intermediate
and advanced weavers. Students
should purchase Clothilde
Barrett's monograph "Double TwoTie Unit Weaves" before the first
class session (available through
the Weaver's Journal).

WEEKEND FLOOR LOOM
An intensive workshop in basic floor loom skills with emphasis on warping procedure and understanding drafts. Students warp a floor loom and weave a sampler that includes twills, double weaves, and other techniques. How to plan a project, calculate quantities of warp and weft, choose a loom, and correct common weaving problems will be discussed. Bring a scissors, tape measure, notebook, graph paper, and miscellaneous yarns you may have. Warp and weft yarns are available at the Guild for a small fee. Novice weavers are cautioned that this class is half as long as Floor loom I and moves very quickly. Students should understand that they cannot expect to master the floor loom with this class alone.



INTERMEDIATE RAG RUGS
Rag rugs can be functional,
beautiful, and challenging.
This class will take rag weaving
a step beyond traditional tabby
weave and offer four different
rug techniques. Students can
choose from double binding, log
cabin, double face twill or
twice woven techniques. Each
student will weave a complete
rug and should bring 3-4 pounds
of the same type fabric.
Prerequisite: Rag Rug I or the
ability to independently warp a
floor loom. Materials fee: \$6
for carpet warp. This will be
available at class.

RELATED CLASSES

TRICKS OF THE TRADE: SHORTCUTS FOR WARPING THE FLOOR LOOM Efficient methods of warping and threading will be presented in this workshop. Particular problems such as handling mohair or fine thread warps will be dealt with. A question-and-answer period will allow students to receive personal help with individual problems.

CARDWEAVING
This class will provide a
thorough introduction to the
fascinating technique of cardweaving. Students will learn to
draft a pattern, will set up a
warp, and learn the basic
weaving and finishing processes.
Contact the Weavers Guild for
information about the required
materials.

BACKSTRAP BELT WEAVING
Weave a belt the Latvian way!
Everything from simple stripes to
complicated patterns can be made
on this simple loom. Both
beginners and advanced weavers
are welcome. Bring pearl cotton
or tightly twisted 2 ply wool,
6" cone from spool of yarn,
beater (paper knife or table
knife), notebook, 6 yards of
carpet warp, 6 yards of cord and
a c-clamp.

TAITING
Enjoy the revival of this
Victorian art form. Learn a
portable and easily mastered
lace making technique which
consists of basic chains and
rings with picots. Bring your
own tatting shuttle and heavier
tatting thread. Traditional
uses and creative contemporary
uses will be explored.

WEAVING INSTRUCTION

INDIVIDUALLY STRUCTURED LESSONS WITH EXPERIENCED WEAVER/TEACHER

FLOOR LOOM TECHNIQUES: INCLUDING CONTRAMARCH, JACK, TAPESTRY, DOUBLE WEAVE, RUG WEAVING AND PATTERN DRAPTING FOR WEAVERS AT ALL LEVELS.

TAPIS

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RELATED CLASSES

IKAT WORKSHOP
Ikat is a method of dyeing a
pattern into a warp prior to
weaving. In this class,
students will prepare a warp and
dye it using acid milling dyes.
The first session will meet at
the Guild, and the warps will be
wound. Dyeing will be done at
instructor's home: 3932 Thomas
Ave. South, Mpls., so that
dyeing and handling of wet warps
can be done outside or in the
garage. Bring white or offwhite tied wool yarn suitable
for a 2½ yard by 20" warp.

DRAFTING

In this class, the basics of drafting will be taught. This aspect of weaving, so often avoided by weavers, will enable the student to work independently from swatches and books. Learn drawdown, fabric analysis, block theory, as well as the characteristics of the basic weaves and an approach to creative drafting. Students should bring notebook, pencil, 10 square to the inch graph paper, and any fabrics or weaving books that they might like to discuss during the class.



BASKETRY IN DEPTH
Baskets are beautiful and
functional art objects. Learn
the techniques of coiling, twining, and plaiting from an award
winning basket maker, using both
natural and manufactured
materials. To help develop
appreciation of this ancient art,
there will be slides, books, many
baskets, and class discussion.
Bring scissors, a small amount
of scrap yarn, notebook, and
pencil to the first class meeting.



fable Linens
This one-day workshop will explore appropriate weave structures and yarns for table linens, care and finishing, empellishments, and general design considerations. The slide lecture will serve as a guide in designing and planning. Please bring graph paper, colored pentils or markers, a ruler for designing your own set of linens. Participants are invited to bring any handwoven linens in their collections.



TEACHERS

Charlotte Jirousek first took up weaving during her work with the Peace Corps in Turkey, where she was involved in organizing a carpet weavers' cooperative.

She has taught floor loom weaving, beginning and advanced color, dyeing, introduction to design, and other subjects while continuing her interest in Islamic and other historic textiles. Her advanced degrees include a master of arts and doctorate in design at the University.

Blanche Krbechek has many years devoted to teaching various subjects and to enjoying fiber arts.' She has been tatting for more than 20 years and enjoys other crafts such as knitting, crochet, originally designed needlepoint, for which she has won state awards.

<u>Linda Madden</u>, a production weaver of table linens and garments, is constantly exploring the possibilities of loom controlled structures and patterns. She received her B.S. in Art Educa-tion, M.A. in Art History and has taught art related classes to people from 3 years through adulthood. Production weaving has allowed her to find the most efficient methods for using traditional equipment and structures without sacrificing quality handweaving.

Connie Magoffin has natural dyeing at the center of her textile world. From this emanates a multitude of applications such as warp monthly natural dye newsletter, and a dyeplant garden at the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum.

Janet Meany has helped organize the Fiber Handcrafters Organization in Duluth and has been actively weaving since 1974. He interest in rag rugs began when she completed a study of weavers and their looms in the Two Harbors area of Minnesota.

arcie Archer O'Connor has an M.A. in Design and has studied fibers in India and at the Pen-land School of Crafts. Spinning and color have become her primary fiber interests.

Paul O'Connor has a primary interest in the weaving of double and multi-layers of fabrics, and in mounting so it can be viewed from several angles. He has presented several BMFM workshops, and has been Guild Treasurer and Mid-West Treasurer.




