
DESIGN NO. 8.

You will surely give it the preference over all other kinds. is manufactured in Nos. 20, 30, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, 90 and 100 in both white and ecru. Try it. All but No. 20 have 500 yards on a spool. urchase Thread, Book and Tidy of your dealer. If you cannot, send 10 cents for Spool, 10 cents for Book, and 5 cents for Tidy to Glasgo Lace Thread Co., and

DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING.

No. 8. BOURBON ROSE TIDY.

It will take 1 3-5 spools of No. 40 Glasgo Twilled Lace Thread for this tidy. It is composed of 25 large wheels and 16 small ones. Join the large wheels together to form a square by catching two points of each wheel to the one next to it as follows, 2 chain, slip stitch in 3rd stitch of point, 2 chain. This is done in the last round of wheel. There will be 16 spaces which fill in with the small wheels.

To make the large wheels. 5 chain, join with slip stitch.

1st round. 8, single crochet in ring, slip stitch in cot sindgle of round.

2nd round. (3 chain, 1 single crochet in each single of last round) 8 times; making 8 loops of 3 chain.

3rd round. (1 single crochet, 3 double crochet, 1 single crochet in the next loop) 8 times.

4th round. (1 single crochet in back part of single in 2nd round, 4 chain) 8 times; slip stitch in 1st single of round.

5th round. (1 sing) mochet, 4 double crochet, 1 single crochet in the next loop; & times.

6th round. (1 single crochet in back part of singles in 4th round, 5 chain) 8 times. Slip stitch in 1st single of round.

7th round. (1 single crochet, 5 double crochet, 1 single crochet in the next loop) 8 times.

8th round. (1 single crochet in back part of singles in 6th round, 6 chain) 8 times; slip stitch in 1st single of round.

9th round. (1 single crochet, 6 double crochet, 1 single crochet in the next loop) 8 times.

10th round. (I single crochet in the back part of singles in the 8th round, 7 chain) 8 times; slip stitch in 1st single of round.

11th round. I slip stitch in 1st 3 stitches of 7 chain, 3 chain, 1 double crochet under 7 chain, 3 chain, 2 double crochet in same place, 3 chain, (2 double crochet under next 7 chain, 3 chain, 2 double crochet in the same place, 3 chain) 7 times; slip stitch in top of 1st 3 chain.

12th round. Slip stitch in next 3 stitches, which will bring you to the middle of 1st loop of 3 chain, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 1 double crochet all in that loop, 2 chain, 1 single in next loop; (2 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 1 double crochet, 5 chain, 1 double crochet, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in next loop, 2 chain, 1 single crochet in next loop) 7 times; 2 chain, 1 slip stitch in 3rd stitch of 1st 5 chain. Break off thread.

13th round. Fasten the thread in 3rd stitch of one of the 5 chain, 13 chain, 1 single crochet in 3rd stitch of next chain) 7 times; 13 chain, slip stitch in the 3rd stitch where thread was fastened, 1 chain.

14th round. I single crochet in each stitch of last round; slip stitch in I chain.

15th round. (9 chain, 1 single crochet in every 7th single of last round) which will bring a single crochet on each point and 1 in middle of the 13 stitches, there will be 16 of the 9 chain, fasten the last chain in slip stitch of last round.

16th round. I single crochet in each stitch of last round except the 5th stitch of each of the 9 chain, in which, work 2 single crochet, slip stitch in 1st single of round. Break off thread.

17th round. Fasten thread in the 1st of the 2 single in the 5th stitch of 9 chain, 3 chain, 1 double crochet in the same single crochet, 3 chain, 2 double crochet in the next single, 5 chain, (2 double crochet in the 1st of the 2 single crochets in the next 5th stitch of the 9 chain, 3 chain, 2 double crochet in the next stitch, 5 chain) 15 times; slip stitch in top of the 1st 3 chain.

18th round. Like the 12 round, there will be 16 points instead of 8.

For the small wheel make the same as the 12 round of the large wheels, but in the last round, join each point of the small wheel to 1 of the points in the large one, just the same as you joined the large wheels.

TERMS USED IN CROCHETING TIDY.

Single crochet. Have one loop on the hook, put the hook into the work, draw the thread through, thread over hook and draw it through both loops.

Double crochet. Have one loop on the hook thread over hook before you put it into the work, draw the thread through work, then thread over hook, draw it through two loops, thread over hook again, and draw it through two more loops.

When the parenthesis is used with a figure following it as in the 2nd round, (3 chain, 1 single crochet in each single of last round) 8 times; means that it is to be crocheted just the number of times as the figure following the parenthesis indicates.
