

MINIATURE PATTERNS FOR HAND WEAVING

PART TWO

Part One of these Miniature Patterns has proved to be very popular and requests for Part Two have been received, hence this booklet. This completes the set of forty-eight drafts for the small patterns. Most of these are reductions of the old Colonial patterns. Some are developments suggested by the old patterns, but are not quite true miniatures of the originals. Some of these have been given new names because they are not exact.

The threading drafts are in the usual form. Brackets above and below show the number of threads in one pattern. In some drafts, twill borders are indicated but are not included in the brackets, as they are used only at the sides of the web. A border at the left side (not shown) should be the reverse of that at the right side. The twill border has been found the most satisfactory for these patterns.

The illustrations include more than just one pattern unless the pattern is a large one. This is done so as to show how the secondary figure appears when it is completed by the repetition of the pattern.

As in Part One, the treadling drafts give the harnesses to be down. If desired, the directions can be changed over to whatever treadles or levers, when operated, give the position wanted. This changing will depend on the type of loom used.

Some patterns consist of two very distinct figures, often quite different. In threading these, care should be used to arrange the design so that the same figure shall appear at each side of the web, balancing the design. This may cause the secondary figure to be omitted in threading the last pattern. Special instructions are given for such patterns. See Mariner's Pride and Maltese Cross.

Many of these patterns are good for small articles; bookmarks, needlebooks, pincushions, etc. Some of them are also attractive for a wider variety of uses including runners, towels, linens and upholstery materials. A few can be used effectively for borders in costume yardage. In short, they are useful wherever it is desirable to keep to the short overshots.


CHURCH WINDOWS







CHURCH WINDOWS, also known as DOUBLE CHARIOT WHEELS, seems to have been used, in many variations, in Colonial times. It probably came to Colonial weavers from the looms of the Scandinavian countries. This miniature is a very appropriate one to be used for articles to harmonize with Colonial or Victorian furnishings.

CROSS OF TENNESSEE










This pattern is known as The Cross or as The Cross of Tennessee, since it was used by early weavers of that state. It is a simple, direct pattern, good either as drawn in or used in rose fashion, and is adaptable to the use of several colors.

DIADEM









DIADEM is a well-covered pattern, and it is suitable for upholstery or for linens. A little study of the illustration shows that it is merely the reverse of the design woven as drawn in, but it is more unusual. A piece done in this pattern will be reversible.




FOURSOME



FOURSOME is a good pattern for general use. It offers good variety and can be used on anything from linens to upholstery. To make the corners like those shown, start the first pattern at *, always reading down.


LONG LANE






LONG LANE was first suggested by the many such patterns, known by various names, to be found among the designs woven by early American weavers. It is much more effective when developed by many repetitions than it can possibly be in any illustration like this.


MALTESE CROSS





MALTESE CROSS, a very popular pattern, has no long overshots, so is usable for upholstery, pillow tops or table mats, and with various materials. To do the corner illustrated, after the border is of the desired width, start threading at thread 25 and the treadling at the star (*).












MARINERS PRIDE






In figuring to thread for MARINER'S PRIDE, it is best to arrange for the heavy figure to appear at each side of the web. To get this, stop the last threading of the draft at thread 22, and make the left border in reverse of the right. This pattern is equally good when woven as drawn in.


Periwinkle makes a good-wearing fabric, since the overshots are so short. A design for upholstery is shown as well as the usual styles.

QUEENS DELIGHT





QUEEN'S DELIGHT, also known as MARY SIMMONS, is a truly Colonial pattern, suitable for use with antique furniture. Since it has short overshots, it should make a good upholstery fabric.




SINGLE SNOWBALL #3 is a very useful pattern, especially if one wishes to weave something that is to be used with Colonial or Victorian furnishings. It resembles very closely one of the old eight-harness Colonial Snowball patterns. This miniature is always good woven as drawn in and can be used with several colors, giving a multicolor effect. It will make a good, firm fabric for upholstery. A number of good borders can be woven with it.


SMALL SINGLE SNOWBALL




After the border, start the first pattern at *. SMALL SINGLE SNOWBALL can be used successfully with three or four colors.
