



HE shirt-waist is still very nearly as popular as it ever has been, and is likely to remain so for some time to come.

The white waist seems to lead in popularity, not because it is more fashionable, but because it is generally becoming to young and old, and looks more dressy, even though plainly made, than the colored waist. The lovely revived needlework of all countries and all times, Hardanger, Russian cross-stitch, Irish crochet, hairpin lace, Egyptian embroidery, Teneriffe wheels, eyelet work, etc., are used in various ways to decorate the newest and prettiest of models.

For a serviceable, inexpensive waist, huckaback may be used, and darned in stripes or all over with wash silks or cottons in two or more shades of any preferred color, in the ocean wave pattern popularly used in decorating couch pillows. It is done by merely sliding the needle under the raised threads of the cloth, to form a wavy, triangular pattern from corner to corner. Pretty shirt-waist belts are made in the same way, and may be worn with any waist with which the colors harmonize. Another shirt-waist trimming consists of wrought Battenberg or handcrocheted rings, placed three or four together to form the leaves of a shamrock, while a curved stem is worked on the cloth in chain or outline stitch. shapes are placed down the centre of the front plait of a heavy linen waist and at either side, extending from the shoulders, in groups of three.

Next to the shirt-waist itself, the stock to wear with it, its suitability and becomingness, is of the utmost interest to the up-to-date girl. A new stock collar has a trimming of large eyelets cut fleur-de-lis shape and buttonholed around with silk. Underneath the openwork are puffings of thin China silk. Another, somewhat on the same idea, is worked with narrow oval-shaped eyelets, and all around and through these a soft, wide, silk ribbon is drawn, and tied at the front in a big, fluffy knot. Daisies in ribbon-work very prettily decorate another stock of white taffeta, to be worn with a dainty shirtwaist of white India linen, embroidered down the front with large white daisies some distance apart. The centres of the flowers are buttonholed around and the cloth inside cut away. Little, flat, gold buttons are fastened to the other side of the waist, the daisy eyelets being used as buttonholes.

Monograms are still embroidered upon shirt-waists, and a pretty touch they give to the simplest waist. They are worked, usually on the sleeve or tie-end, or even upon the watch-pocket or front of belt. Sometimes they are padded heavily and worked in a close satin-stitch, or the outlines may be worked in a fancy embroidery stitch, with another fancy stitch worked in the centre.

Most needleworkers are familiar with the fancy stitches used in the popular embroideries and lace-work of the day, and these and their many varieties may be used to good effect in adorning the new shirt-waists. Of the simpler stitches, the satin, outline, cross, French knot, and chain stitches are the most important, being the most commonly used. The satin-stitch consists merely in laying the threads from side to side or lengthwise, taking but one stitch the width or length of the form to be filled, so close together that the stitches can hardly be separated. A little padding or stuffing with soft knitting cotton split into two or three strands may be necessary. In padding, the threads must run opposite to those with which they are afterwards overlaid. The chain-stitch may be used for stems and wherever the outline-stitch can be used. It is made like the buttonhole stitch in working the first stitch, except that the needle is inserted a little farther away from where it was first brought up. The thread should not be pulled exactly tight, but allowed to lie a little loose, to give the rounded curve necessary. The sec-ond buttonhole stitch is taken just inside of the curved edge of the first, working always toward instead of away from you. In place of the outline or chain stitch, a close, narrow feather-stitch or French knots may be used in following the out-

lines of the design. A simple shirt-waist trimming for straps and collar and cuffs consists of three feather-stitches, then three French knots in triangle form, then three feather-stitches, and so on, worked in a row. Wild roses may be worked in long-andshort buttonhole, the centres also buttonholed and the tiny piece inside cut away, with a spider worked in yellow silk filling in the open space in the centre.

Another form of decoration consists of appliqué work. Outline upon pink silk or satin a wild rose pattern, then cut out, leaving a margin outside of the traced lines. Baste this carefully to the waist, then work in long-and-short buttonhole through both materials, following the outlines of the design, with the straight edge of the buttonhole toward the outside of the pattern. Cut away carefully that part of the pink silk or satin outside of the buttonhole. The centre of the flower is embroidered with yellow French

### Suggestions for Home **Decoration**

Edited by Alice Chittenden

A Seaside Bungalow has the large living-room, which must serve both by day and night, divided into compartments by the use of large bamboo porch screens so arranged that they can be rolled up during the day.

A restful Guest Room is one of the chief charms of a house. If the keynote of color is a restful one, the other furnishings will readily fall into line. A simple greenish cream matting with walls in French gray and touches of rose and green in the furnishings is delightful by reason of its simplicity.

The Den of a Literary Woman, too small for a desk, has fitted in one angle of the wall, at just the right height, a board like a section of a circle supported by wooden brackets. Under this is placed a capacious waste-basket, and above it a corner Japanese cabinet in bamboo, containing many small shelves and pigeon-holes.

A Narrow Hall should always be papered in some tone of yellow, which is the only color that makes a room look wider. I have just had a den, 7 x 12, hung in a warm yellow, and the result increase greatly the apparent width of the room. The old shade of red seemed to bring the walls ridiculously close together.

The Old-fashioned Bed with its cumbersome headboard, a famous dust and germ collector, has been rightfully banished from our homes. Remember that if you have any of this sort that you cannot afford to part with, a judicious use of the saw will remove the objectionable portion and often, in this way, the beauty of the article may be enhanced.

A friend has just furnished four Bedrooms all on the same floor with flower papers. In a west room, chrysanthemums from pale yellow to deep reddish brown; in a southeast room, apple blossoms from pale to rosy pink; in a northeast room, deep red roses. A room with only a north light is aglow with the yellow California poppy.

Old Bedroom Furniture may be successfully treated with white or cream enamel at home if the old paint is first thoroughly removed; when perfectly dry give a coat of white lead; forty-eight hours after a second coat, both applied as thin as possible. Then give a coat of enamel and afterwards rub down with pumice-stone and oil, finishing with a second coat of the enamel.

An old pair of Linen Sheets, yellowed with age, were ripped in two by parting the seam down the middle, worked with a rapid design, in "Walls of Troy" in red, blue, black, and variously shaded wash silks, using the odds and ends of a collection. The two pairs of curtains thus made have an imported air that makes beholders exclaim, "Where did you get them?"

If you are so fortunate as to have Old Samplers, black silhouette portraits, such as our grandparents used to exchange, old steel engravings or antique colored pictures, collect them all in one room, preferably a library, grouping them effectively. 

The handsome waists found in the shops are too long for one woman, too short for another. The sleeves do not fit at the elbows for many women. Such a waist must be worn with the hope that its inappropriateness for the form of the wearer will be overlooked on account of the beauty of the garment, or it must solidly with black silk on a waist of be re-fitted, which often destroys the black China silk, either with or with-symmetry of its out insets of black best lines. 


FIG. 1. PATTERN OF SLEEVELESS JACKET

1st and 2d rows—Knit plain. These two rows form a ridge or "purl." Knit 58 of these ridges, then cast on 58 stitches more, making 116 on the needle.

Knit 58 ridges with the 116 stitches. Bind off 58 stitches, taking care not to draw the edge; then knit 58 ridges with the remaining 58 stitches. Bind off

loosely. This makes a knitted piece shaped as shown in Fig. 1.

Join the edges A and B together, also those numbered C and D, by sewing with some of the yarn, leaving the edges E and F loose for arm-holes.

Crochet scallops around the jacket and arm-holes and fasten with buttons and loops or bow of ribbon.

### **Crochet Plate Doily**



Border.—Fourteen d c on edge of mat, turn, ch 10, fasten back in 7th st, turn, half fill loop with 6 d c and 2 picots (as in the insertion), turn, ch 16, fasten back in 7th st on edge, turn, fill loop with 14 d c and 6 picots, finish filling 1st loop with 6 d c and 2 picots, 7 d c on edge, turn, ch 16, fasten in top of 1st loop, turn, one-third fill with 2 d c, picot, 2 d c, picot, I d c, turn, ch 12, fasten back in 10th st (or top of opposite loop), turn, half fill with 2 d c, picot, 2 d c, picot, I d c, turn, ch 16, fasten back in 10th st, turn, fill loop with 14 d c and 6 picots, finish filling next loop. Then make 2 d c, picot, 2 d c, picot, 1 d c in next unfinished loop, turn, ch 16, fasten in top of last finished loop, turn, 2 d c, picot, 2 d c, picot, I d c in loop, turn, ch 12, fasten in top of opposite loop, turn, 12 d c and 5 picots in loop, finish next loop with 1 d c, picot, 2 d c, picot, 2 d c, picot, 2 d c, picot, 2 d c equally separated by 6 picots, finish | d c, then last loop with 1 d c, picot, 2 d







### Grab Bag for a Fair

By Jessie M. De Witt

THE grab bag was pronounced the most attractive feature at our church fair last year, and as the idea was entirely my own original one perhaps it may prove useful to those

who are planning for fairs.

Considerable curiosity was aroused previous to the fair by the announcement that "Aunt Polly" would be present, and to all queries concerning Aunt Pollu's identity, the answer was "Come Polly's identity, the answer was and see." Upon entering the hal Upon entering the hall, Aunt Polly, who represented an elderly country lady in old-fashioned hood and shawl, with a bulging reticule in one hand and a green umbrella under her arm, stood grimly in a corner. Upon one shoulder was pinned a placard with this inscription: "Aunt Polly has been doing her Christmas shopping. pockets are filled with treasures. may relieve her of one package for ten cents." A young lady was in attend ance, and the patrons, upon paying the fee, were allowed to reach into Aunt Polly's capacious pocket and remove one package. If they were not satis-fied with their purchase, they were allowed to return it and draw a second time for three cents.

Now as to Aunt Polly's make-up; it may be as elaborate as you choose. I presume a dress-maker's dummy and a false face could be used to advantage, but ours was entirely home made.

Make a support formed of two pieces of wood just long enough to rest across the top of a barrel, crossed with an upright, made of a broomstick, long enough so that when the support stands on top of a barrel, the stick will reach into the head of the figure. Drive tacks in the broom-stick at a proper height for the waist of the figure, and fasten wires from them to the ends of the cross-pieces, and then weave the wire around to form hips for the dummy. Above this pin a pillow around the upright and a small feather cushion for the head. Make a face by simply cut-ting one in profile from a doubled piece of factory cloth and stitching it to-gether. Pin this in place over the cushion and stuff with cotton. Eyes and shading are done with a pencil, false hair and spectacles should be added. Pin an old undershirt about the body and stuff the sleeves and shoulders with rags. An old corset snugly laced will give the figure the proper shape. When the figure is fastened securely to the top of barrel it is ready to be dressed. The pocket is simply a slit in the skirt just above the top of the barrel in which the articles are placed.
