


Note: the two lectures will be the same. Be sure to see also the lace exhibit at the Guild!

ON FEAR

Fear - I experience it frequently and deny it often. It ranges from the ridiculous to the sublime. I may intellectualize it as being crazy or unwarranted or bizarre or stupid, but irregardless of any of that it exists. I'm discovering that I react to fear in several ways with interesting results.

The "ostrich" ploy. I ignore my fears in hopes that they will go away.
