After graduating from the University of Minnesota she herself began weaving on a 100 year old handcrafted loom adapting the traditional techniques of her Grandmother to her own modern tastes. The workshop on May 21st and 22nd will deal with the pratical techniques of cloth strip weaving, such as joining strips, best materials to use, mixing fabrics and yarn for special pattern effects. Mary has a wonderful sense of humor in addition to a thorough grasp of her subject matter which should make for a very enjoyable workshop and talk. Frame loom weavers are welcome to use their looms in this workshop.

#### VIRGINIA WEST WORKSHOP

A group of weavers interested in weaving clothing gathered for Virginia West's workshop March 12, 13, and 14. Fourteen looms were dressed, each with one of Virginia's drafts which she has designed for use in weaving lovely coutourier fabrics.

Virginia began by describing the characteristics of each draft, including tips for the production weavers, and showing us slides of garments she has made using the drafts. Then -- off to the looms! Yarns were supplied with each draft, and participants had brought a variety of their own yarns to experiment with, so our samples were quite varied. By noon on Sunday, after much concentrated hard work, the swatches were cut off the looms and we gathered around for a critique, one of the most valuable aspects of the workshop. Virgina examined each group of swatches, commenting

on textures, colors, and drapability, and giving suggestions about what type of garment would be most suitable for each.

Several more weavers joined the group on Sunday afternoon for a session on adapting our handwoven fabrics to our various sizes and shapes. Virginia illustrated with patterns from her book, Weavers' Wearables, and gave each person several miniature patterns to cut out and assemble. After deciding on a garment, we each went to work with muslin, scissors, pins and needles, creating a personal pattern, adding a dart here, taking a seam there. All the while, Virginia circulated among us, answering questions and offering ideas.

This very informal session, with a lot of discussion and giveand-take, was very productive; among other things, we discussed

# MIDWEST CONFERENCE

GUILD TREKS TO IOWA FOR EXCITING MIDWEST CONFERENCE

Many Minnesota Weavers will be taking the short 3-hour drive to Ames, Iowa, July 8-11, for the Midwest Weavers Conference.

Gerhardt Knodel, head of the Fiber Department at the Cranbrook Academy of Art, will be the major speaker. By invitation, leading fiber Artists will show representative works. Likewise, many weavers are signing up for the 35 mini sessions including paper making, Tarascan Lace, quilting, sheep fleece judging, felting, techniques in batik and punjabi weaving.

You may also sign up for maxi sessions in Norwegian Aklevev, traditional weaves, creative spinning, block designing, and double weave.

Weavers will stay at Iowa State University in air-conditioned dorm rooms and eat at the University. Rates are very reasonable.

In addition to these events, there will be an outstanding fashion show, a variety of techniques shown in individual guild members and guild exhibits, commercial exhibits, tours, and a swatch swap.



Spring is here! It's time to do some serious thinking about garden plans and while you are arranging places for color and produce, keep in mind that the plants you choose might also double as dye plants.

The following list includes garden flowers, shrubs, trees, fruits, vegetables and herbs that I have successfully used for dyeing. It is not intended to be a complete dye plant list. I have not included weeds or plants that I have not yet tested. In the parentheses I have suggested which plant parts you might try when dyeing.

- apple (leaves/bark)
- 2. bloodroot (root)
- 3. blue Concord grape (fruit)
- 4. blue morning glory (flower)
- 5. buckthorn (berries/leaves)
- 6. butternut (nuts/leaves)
- camomile (flowers/whole plant)
- 8. carrot (leaves)
- coreopsis (flowers/whole plant)
- 10. gloriosa daisy (flowers)
- 11. juniper (berries)
- 12. lilac (bark)
- 13. lily of the valley (leaves)
- 14. marigold (flowers)
- 15. orange cosmos (flowers)
- 16. poplar (leaves)
- 17. privet (leaves)
- 18. purple iris (flowers)
- 19. purple-leaf sand cherry (leaves)
- 20. red dahlia (flowers)
- 21. red hollyhock (flowers)
- 22. red zinnia (flowers)
- 23. sumac (berries/bark/leaves)
- 24. tansy (flowers/whole plant)
- 25. walnut (nuts/leaves)

May 14,15,16 WEEKEND FLOOR LOOM I taught by Char Miller. Students learn to warp a floor loom and weave a sampler using many techniques including twill weave and double weave. Friday, 6-10 pm; Saturday, 9-4 pm; Sunday, noon-4 pm. \$55, non-members:\$45 members

May 21,22,23: CRACKLE WEAVES WEEKEND taught by Diane Swanson. Crackle weave offers opportunities for original designs as well as some traditional patterns and some methods that produce the look of bargello. Check to find out how to warp the loom before Friday. Friday, 6-10 pm; Saturday 9-4 pm; Sunday, 12-4 pm. \$55, non-members;\$45, members

Saturdays. 9 am-noon

May 22-June 12: NATURAL DYES II taught by Connie Magoffin. Class will begin with a quick review of the mordant and dye process. Experiments with top-dyeing, tie-dyeing, tritik, color modifiers, and the dying of numerous fibers, in addition to wool. will be included. Emphasis will be placed on student participation. Finally, there will be a brief study of the fascinating history of natural dyes and a field trip for plan identification. Materials fee covers all materials needed for the course. Tuition: \$37.50 nm (includes \$2.50 materials fee);\$32.50, members.

GUILD CLASSES (cont.)

June 4,5,6: IKAT WEEKEND with Char Miller Ikat is a method of dyeing a pattern into a warp prior to weaving. In this class, students will prepare a warp and dye it using acid milling dyes during the course of the weekend. The first session will meet at the Guild, and the warps will be wound. Dyeing will be done Saturday and Sunday at the instructor's home, 3932 Thomas Ave. So., so that dyeing and handling of wet warps can be done outside (or in the garage in case of rain). Students should bring white or off-white tied wool yarn suitable for a 2-1/2 yard by 20 inch warp. Other materials will be provided by the instructor for a \$5.00 fee. Tuition: \$55.00; \$45.00, nonmembers. Friday, 6-10 pm; Saturday, 9-4 pm; Sunday, noon to 4 pm.

9 am-1 pm

June 14-18: FRAME LOOM I with Mary Temple Explore your weaving heritage on a simple, versatile loom. Students learn the basic skills while weaving a wall hanging, carrying bag, pillows, or a table runner. Learn plain weaving, patterns, and textures. Students must bring their own Beka, Erica, or Kircher frame loom. Bring loom, spool of cotton carpet warp, notebook, pencil, scissors, tape measure, and a 10# steel crochet hook to first class. Tuition: \$55; \$45, non-members.

GUILD CLASSES (cont).

June 18,19,20: WEEKEND FLOOR LOOM I taught by Char Miller. An intensive workshop in basic floor loom skills with emphasis on warping procedure and understanding drafts. Students warp a floor loom and weave a sampler that includes twills, double weaves, and other techniques. How to plan a project, calculate quantities of warp and weft, choosing a loom, and correct common weaving problems will be discussed. Bring a scissors, tape measure. notebook, graph paper, and miscellaneous yarns you may have. Warp and weft yarns are available at the Guild for a small fee. Friday 6-10 pm; Saturday 9-4 pm; Sunday, noon-4 pm. Tuition: \$55, non-members; \$45, members.

June 21 9 am-3 pm

TAPESTRY: AN INTRODUCTION with Kathy McMahon. Spend a day learning basic tapestry techniques while weaving a small tapestry. Use a rigid heddle frame loom or build your own small tapestry loom. Loom should be warped for class. Warping instructions available at Guild or from teacher. Tuition: \$23 non-members: \$18, members.

June 21-24:

QUILTING Students will design, select fabrics and construct a patchwork quilt or wall hanging under the direction of Charlene Burningham. Techniques to be covered are patchwork, applique, and log cabin. Tuition: \$50, non-members; \$40, members Follow up session: Tuesday, August 17.

June 23,24: 9 am-3 pm 2 days

TAPESTRY: IN DEPTH with Kathy McMahon. Bring your warped loom, yarns and drawing supplies (crayons, paints, colored pencils, etc.) along with some design ideas. With the instructor you will finalize design, make a cartoon and begin weaving a tapestry. There will be a follow up class to discuss completed works and finishing techniques. Pre-requisite: knowledge of basic tapestry techniques. Please bring a bag lunch. Follow up meeting to discuss the completed tapestries will be held Wednesday. August 18. Tuition: \$23, nonmembers; \$18, members.

PHILIS ALVIC LECTURE

Variations on One Warp" was the theme of the lecture given by guest weaver, Philis Alvic, at the Guild's April meeting.

Alvic started developing her ideas about working on one warp when she researched and worked for her Certificate of Excellence of the Handweavers Guild of America. She starts with one long warp, uses a basic pattern such as Summer and Winter, and works within this rigid format.

"I start with an idea," she said, "but it often develops into new designs, often through the use of different colors."

She challenged Guild members to use different color combinations. "We were often told by our elementary teachers that certain colors such as red and green should not be used together. That is incorrect." She proved her point with one of her wall hangings which was exhibited during her visit.

Alvic showed many slides. It was amazing how four different weavings, all from the same warp, could look so different.

She taught a two-day workshop, April 2 and 3, when each weaver was given a specific problem, such as a plain warp in a Summer and Winter pattern or random stripes in an overshot pattern. Each wove six-inch long samples using problems in color, pattern, and texture, and a variety of yarns. She dared students to use colors and color combinations which they never used before.

Minnesota's theatre of weather treated our guest from Kentucky to a great variation. She wore a sundress and jacket made of handwoven silk fabric to the lecture Thursday night. Friday she wore a handsome jacket which will be featured in a future issue of Shuttle, Spindle, and Dyepot. A spring blizzard created hazardous driving conditions on Saturday. Then Alvic wore boots. However, she never needed the long underwear she brought.



MAY GUILD EXHIBIT



Future meetings will be held the fourth Monday of the month. Plans include help with increasing and decreasing, buttonhole techniques, sweater designs, converting flat patterns to circular knitting, cable stitch techniques, and finishing. Everyone is welcome.



# AS THE WHEEL TURNS

The local market price of wool has dropped to .45/pound, which could foretell disaster for spinners. This price is 55.6% of last year's price of .81/pound, at this same peak time. At this rate, many sheep owners are discarding their wool rather than selling it at such low prices-especially those sheep owners who have to take or ship the wool to market. softness of the wool market, according to Marshall Ham of the Saint Peter Woolen Mill, is due to the high demand for New Zealand fine wools and British long wools-not for medium wools and crossbreeds which we tend to have locally.

The disaster for spinners will occur if the sheep owners opt to slaughter their sheep and lambs rather than retaining them for wool production or changing to more marketable breeds. Black fleeces could become unavailable or priced so high as to have the same effect. Locally grown fleeces, identified by breed and maybe even the sheep's name, might disappear.

What can spinners do? Buy wool from your neighborhood flock. Offer a decent price, one that will enable the owner to remain in business profitably. One dollar and fifty cents is still a very good price for fleece and offers more of an incentive to growers than .45/pound.

# KARON RUCKER

"INVESTIGATING YOUR FOCUS" -- the struggle of each artist to find their way of working and expressing concepts.

Karon Rucker will be coming to the Guild this summer to help all of us - weavers, spinners, dyers, and all fiber artists-investigate our focus. This is an area seldom addressed and yet vital to the growth of individual work. Her workshop will be held Tuesday, Wednesday, & Thursday, June 29, 30, and July 1, from 9 am - 3 pm. Tuition is \$45.00 for members.

Karon begins with the assumption that all techniques appropriate to our particular fiber interest are known or can be learned. But we must face the nitty-gritty: content, the formal concerns of color, line, texture, shape; and the biggest issue of all - the struggle of each fiber artist to find a way of working and expressing concepts or a unique illumination of a formal aspect. The nucleus of the question is the identification of that focus.

Is the identification of that focus.

Slides of Karon's own work and the work of other fiber artista/weavers will be presented to show several different ways of thinking about and approaching work. Participants will be given a number of questions to open up thoughts about focus. Open discussion will be encouraged throughout this workshop. Participants will be asked to bring representative selections of work and share insights gained form their personal evaluations. An examination of the creative process, and how we can make it work better for us will begin, followed by more questions leading to further investigation. And, a discussion of ways of making choices in our work, so that our ideas don't cancel each other out will lead to the identification of each individual's primary idea.

Karon lives in Malibu. California, and has studied Drama.

She has worked as an interior designer; an instructor of textiles, fibers, weaving, design, and stage make-up at several colleges in California; and a workhsop leader for several guilds and private groups throughout California. Karon's extensive fiber and weaving and teaching background, coupled with her very enthusiastic approach, make this a workshop NOT TO BE MISSED!

## PETER COLLINGWOOD


Peter Collingwood is an internationally renown author and weaver who resides in Great Britain. He holds several honors bestowed on him by the Queen of England, including the Order of the British Empire. Peter is probably best known for "The Techniques of Rug Weaving", the most complete and thorough coverage of the methods and techniques of weaving rugs under one title. He has also written "Sprang", a book which stands alone as the ultimate word on the subject. Best known as a limited production weaver, Peter continues to be innovative - he is working on Macrogauze. (It's difficult to describe, so we'll leave it to him to describe it when he is here.)

Peter Collingwood is both a scholar and a teacher. And, as a teacher, he takes great care to explain techniques very clearly and thoroughly. He teaches not only the "how" of a design or technique, but even more importantly, covers the "why" of the design or technique. His very thorough knowledge of rug weaving, coupled with a precise and methodical approach to weaving, will make this an extremely valuable and in-depth workshop for the weaver serious about increasing her/his skills. Excellent models and samples will also be brought along for participants to learn from.

Terry Stanley (Secretary of the WGM Board) has taken several workshops Peter has taught, and has also worked with him in his studio. She highly recommends taking this workshop, "You can't miss this outstanding opportunity!....It's a joy to take a Peter Collingwood workshop!" Terry adds that you will work hard, but that the rewards are extremely valuable.

This workshop will be an in-depth study of three ways to control block weaves: loom-controlled, pick-up-controlled, and shaft-switching-controlled. Block weaves are generally woven with two colors and give rectangular blocks of these two colors, the colors reversing on the back side of the fabric. The width of the blocks of color is the direct result of either the threading pattern and shaft switching or by manipulation of the warp using pick-up sticks. Block weaves are a design tool - a very flexible and important design tool a weaver should have in her/his repertoire of weaving knowledge.

The workshop will be held Tuesday through Saturday, September 7 to 11. Tuition will be \$100.00 for members. Further details, instructions, materials, etc. will be available a bit later this summer. A public lecture will also be scheduled during his stay in Minneapolis/St.Paul.


