THE WEAVING BOND TRANSCENDS DISTANCE BETWEEN NEW NAMES & FAR PLACES

"WEAVERS WITHIN REACH OF THE UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA AT MINNEA-POLIS THIS SUMMER ARE VERY FORTU-NATE AND PRIVILEGED PEOPLE.
FIRST, THERE IS AN EXHIBIT OF THE WORK OF AMERICAN CRAFTSMEN ON DISPLAY AT THE UNIVERSITY GALLERY.
TEXTILES WOVEN BY THE ABLEST OF AMERICAN WEAVERS FURNISH THE BACK-GROUND FOR CERAMICS AND METAL, AND THE WHOLE IS A MOST SATIS-FYING EXPERIENCE.

THERE IS A SMALL WHITE, BLACK, AND GOLD TAPESTRY IN A MODERN DE-SIGN BY ANNI ALBERS. MARIANNE STRENGEL EXHIBITS FOUR LENGTHS OF DRAPERY AND UPHOLSTERY--AN ORANGE AND GOLD DRAPERY WITH WARM COLOR-ING AND SUBTLE STRIPES; ANOTHER WHICH SHE RIGHTFULLY CALLS "WILD RICE, " WOVEN ON A WHITE WARP WITH WEFT THREADS OF SMOOTH BLACK AND NUBBY WHITE. HELEN KRAMER'S "GOLD OMBRE" IS A GOLD TEXTURE WITH AN ELUSIVE STRIPE WHICH IS PATTERN AND STILL NOT PATTERN. THERE IS A BEIGE SCARF BY BERTA FREY, WITH TINY YELLOW FEATHERS WOVEN INTO THE BORDER -- A TRIFLE EXOTIC, BUT NICE. DOROTHY LIEBES PRESENTS SAMPLES IN TONES OF GREY, WHITE, AND BLACK WITH UNDERTONES OF METALLIC. TO SHOW THAT SHE

HAS NOT FORGOTTEN THE APPEAL OF COLOR, THERE IS A RED, GREEN, AND BROWN PLAID WITH THE INEVITABLE METALLIC TOUCHES. LILI BLUMENAU'S YELLOW AND GOLD UPHOLSTERY IS VERY EXCITING; PERHAPS SENSATION-AL RATHER THAN PRACTICAL. ROBERT SAILORS HAS A MOST IMPRESSIVE DISPLAY OF UPHOLSTERY AND DRA-PERY FABRICS---A GAY PLAID IN GREEN, BLUE, AND SCARLET AND GREY WHICH COMBINES ROUGH WITH SHINY THREADS MOST SUCCESSFULLY. HE ALSO SHOWS A NOVEL DRAPERY WOVEN ON A WARP OF TEN ENDS BROWN BOU-CLE ALTERNATING WITH TWO OF SPUN THE WARPS ARE COARSELY GLASS. SPACED AND THE WEAVING IS DONE WITH FLAT STRIPS OF TORN COTTON FABRIC ABOUT 3/4" WIDE-TWO YEL-LOW AND FOLLOWED BY ONE WHITE. A MAN NEED NOT CONCERN HIMSELF WITH LAUNDRY PROBLEMS! HIS OTHER PIECES, HOWEVER, ARE BOTH PRACTI-CAL AND BEAUTIFUL, WITH EMPHASIS ON HEAVY TEXTURE AND SUBTLE COLOR COMBINATIONS. THERE IS POETRY IN BOTH THE NAMES AND IN THE COLOR USED BY GLADYS ROGERS BROPHIL IN HER WEAVING. "COLORTONE" IS A BEIGE BOUCLE W OVEN ON A VARICO-LORED WARP SHADING THROUGH DEEP GOLD, TURQUOISE, GREEN, ROSE, AND PURPLE. "SILVER MIST" IS A SHEER GREY TEXTURED DRAPERY WITH SILVER THREADS, AND "LUXURIA", A BROWN AND METALLIC BACKGROUND FOR SMALL PASTEL FIGURES. "SNOWSTORM CONTINUED PAGE 4

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MORE ABOUT OUR SAMPLE

ON PAGE 3 WE HAVE GIVEN NO SUG GESTION FOR USING THE SAMPLE. HOWEVER, RARE INDEED IS THE CHILD WHO IS WILLING TO PRACTICE ANY THING WITHOUT HAVING A DIRECT USE IN MIND. THIS MATERIAL COULD BE USED IN SEVERAL WAYS, DEPENDING ON THE CHILD, HIS AGE AND THE IN-TEREST TOPMOST IN HIS MIND.

FOR A VERY SMALL CHILD, A FEW INCHES IS A GREAT DEAL, SO WE SUGGEST WEAVING NO MORE THAN 8".
FOLD IT IN HALF ALONG THE WIDTH OF THE WEB, SEW THE EDGES TOGETHER WITH PADDING INSIDE IF DESIRED, AND PRESTO! A POTHOLDER FOR MOTHER. ON SOME LOOMS, DEPENDING ON THE STYLE AND EASE OF OPERATION, A CHILD AS YOUNG AS FIVE CAN WEAVE A PROJECT OF THIS SIMPLICITY—WITH EXTREME PRIDE OF ACHIEVEMENT.


BOY SCOUTS, GIRL SCOUTS, CAMP-FIRE GIRLS, 4 H CLUBS, ALL DRAW FROM THE GROUPS OF OLDER BOYS AND GIRLS. SOME OF THESE ORGANIZA-TIONS INCLUDE RECOGNITION FOR A-CHIEVEMENT IN VARIOUS FIELDS, AND OFTEN WEAVING IS ONE OF THESE. A PIECE SIMILAR TO OUR SAMPLE WOULD BE A GREAT STEP TOWARD THIS ACCOMPLISHMENT. THE INTERMEDIATE GIRL SCOUT GROUP, FOR INSTANCE, REQUIRES THAT A PIECE OF MATERIAL BE WOVEN ON ANY TYPE LOOM AVAIL-ABLE. IT MIGHT BE GOOD TO EN-COURAGE PROGRESS IN SEWING BY USING THE HAND WOVEN PIECE TO MAKE SOME SIMPLE ARTICLE REQUIRED FOR THE SEWING BADGE. THE GIRL SCOUTS REQUIRE THE SEWING OF A POUCH BAG, CULOTTE, OR MITTENS, AND THE MA-TERIAL OF THIS MONTH'S SAMPLE COULD WELL BE USED FOR THE POUCH BAG. SOME OF THE REQUIRED SEAMS AND STITCHES COULD BE ACCOM-PLISHED AT THE SAME TIME.

SISTER GOODWEAVER CAUTIONS:
THE WAY TO BE SURE
THERE IS NOTHING WRONG
IS TO CHECK EACH STEP
AS YOU GO ALONG.

FOR THE INTERMEDIATE AGE GROUP A SIMPLE POUCH BAG

WEAVE THE MATERIAL ABOUT 9"
BY 18". AS SOON AS IT IS TAKEN
FROM THE LOOM, OVERCAST THE ENDS
OR MACHINE STITCH THEM TO PREVENT RAVELLING.

FOLD EVENLY IN HALF THE SHORT WAY, AND SEW THE SIDE SEAMS TIGHTLY BY HAND OR MACHINE. THE SEAMS MAY GO ALL THE WAY TO THE BOTTOM OF THE BAG FOR A FLAT STYLE, OR A SLIGHT BOXED EFFECT MAY BE MADE WITH THE T SEAM DESCRIBED BELOW:



SIDE VIEW SIDE VIEW STEP 1 STEP 2 DOTTED LINES DENOTE STITCHING

THE OVERCAST OF STITCHED EDGES HAVE BECOME THE TOP OF THE BAG. TURN UNDER ABOUT HALF AN INCH AND BASTE. TURN A SECOND TIME AND HEM NEATLY BY HAND USING STRONG THREA AND SMALL STITCHES.


BUY TEN OR TWELVE SMALL
PLASTIC RINGS. DISTRIBUTE THEM
AN EVEN DISTANCE APART AND SEW
THEM INSIDE THE TOP OF THE BAG.
THEY MUST TAKE MUCH STRAIN, SO
MUST BE TIGHTLY SEWN. THEY ARE
USED TO GUIDE THE HANDLES.

MAKE TWO BRAIDED OR TWISTED CORDS ABOUT 28" LONG FOR HANDLES, PULL THEM THROUGH THE RINGS ON OF POSITE SIDES OF THE BAG FOR HANDLES TO GO OVER THE ARM. TIE THE ENDS OF THE CORDS TOGETHER TO PREVENT FRAYING, AND TO GIVE A NICE FINISH.


CHILDREN'S CHARMER

ALONG ABOUT THIS TIME OF A SUMMER VACATION, THE CHILDREN ARE APT TO LOOKING FOR SOMETHING NEW AND INTER ESTING TO DO, AND OF COURSE IF YOU ARE WEAVING, THAT IS EXACTLY WHA! APPEALS TO THEM. WE ARE SUGGESTING THEREFORE, THAT THIS MONTH'S WARP & WEFT BE USED TO INTRODUCE WEAVING TO THE CHILD. WITH MINOR ADAPTATIONS TO FIT INDIVIDUAL REQUIREMENTS AND THE USE OF INEXPENSIVE MATERIALS, THE SENSE OF PERSONAL ACHIEVEMENT WILL BE VERY GREAT INDEED!

SINGLE IN 15 DENT REED

THE WARP WE USED WAS AN INEXPENSIVE NATURAL COTTON, SLIGHTLY LIGHT-ER IN WEIGHT THAN A CARPET WARP. IT WAS APPROXIMATELY THE SIZE OF 10/2, UNMERCERIZED AND LOOSE TWIST. HERE IS AN EXCELLENT OPPORTUNITY TO USE SMALL AMOUNTS OF LEFT OVER THREAD, OR USE ANY INEXPENSIVE WARP WHICH IS STRONG ENOUGH NOT TO BREAK EASILY.

WEFT:

THE TAN COTTON USED IN THE WEFT IS SIZE 4/4 SOFT TWIST CARPET WARP. IT IS AVAILABLE IN A WIDE RANGE OF COLORS AT TINKLER & CO., 527 ARCH STREET, PHILADELPHIA, 6, PENNSYLVANIA. IT COMES ON TUBES WEIGHING APPROXIMATELY A HALF POUND, AND SELLS FOR \$1.05 LB. IN COLORS AND \$.95 LB. FOR NATURAL. THESE COLORS ARE KNOWN AS COMMERCIALLY FAST; THAT IS FAST UNDER NORMAL CONDITIONS TO WASHING WITH WHITE SOAP AND LUKE WARM WATER.

THE NOVELTY RAYON WE USED WAS ONE WITH LARGE NUBS, WIDELY AND IR-REGULARLY SPACED. ANY NOVELTY LEFT OVER THREAD MIGHT BE USED FOR THIS ACCENT.

DON'T FORGET: TINKLER & CO., 527 ARCH ST., PHILADELPHIA, 6, PENN.
IS THE SOURCE FOR THIS UNUSUAL SIZE CARPET WARP. THEY ALSO HAVE OTHER UNUSUAL THREADS; SEND FOR THEIR SAMPLES.

SUNSET" IS AN EXAMPLE OF DOUBLE WEAVING IN WHICH THE RED COTTON BOTTOM LAYER APPEARS AS THE BACK-GROUND FOR THE TOP LAYER OF SOFT WHITE WOOL WHICH HAS BEEN CUT IN AN ORIGINAL FRINGE TECHNIQUE.

THERE ARE MANY FINE FABRICS SHOWN IN THIS COLLECTION. A FEW HAVE BEEN WOVEN IN THE TRADITIONAL MANNER, BUT THE MAJORITY EMPHASIZE TEXTURE AND COLOR. THOUGH SOME-TIMES SENSATIONAL AND EXOTIC RATH-ER THAN PRACTICAL, THEY ALL SHOW THAT THE WEAVER IS TRYING TO CREATE A FABRIC IN HARMONY WITH MODERN LIVING.

THE SECOND PRESENTATION IN THE MINNEAPOLIS AREA OF INTEREST TO WEAVERS IS THE OFFERING OF A SIX WEEKS COURSE UNDER THE DIRECTION OF MISS INGEBORG LONGBERS. QUOTE FROM AN ARTICLE IN HANDWEAS VER & CRAFTSMAN OF FALL, 1950, SHE "THE LITTLE SISTER OF THE BIG SISTER WHO, THIRTY YEARS AGO, FOUNDED THE HANDWEAVING SCHOOL OF SATERGLANTAN, IN SWEDEN." SHE IS ACCOMPANIED BY THE BIG SISTER, ELSA KRISTINA, WHO, THOUGH SHE RE-MAINS IN THE BACKGROUND, STILL IS READY WITH ADVICE AND INSPIRATION. THE UNIVERSITY HAS PUT AT THEIR DISPOSAL THE WEAVING FACILITIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ART EDUCATION. LINING THE WALLS OF THE WEAVING ROOM ARE DRAPERIES, RUGS, LINENS, AND TEXTILES OF ALL SORTS--ALL DISTINGUISHED BY SUBTLE COLORS AND EXQUISITE WORKMANSHIP, MUTE EVIDENCE OF THE YEARS OF WORK BY THE SISTERS IN SWEDEN. TWENTY-THREE STUDENTS ARE REGISTERED IN THE COURSE, SOME FOR ACADEMIC CRED-IT AND SOME FOR FUN. EACH HAS HIS OWN LOOM AND HIS OWN PROJECT. RUGS AND TAPESTRIES IN INTERLACKAN, FLOSSA, RYA, DOUBLE ROSEPATH, AND INLAY ARE ALL THERE ON THE STUDENT LOOMS.

HOW FORTUNATE WEAVERS IN MINNE-SOTA ARE, AND HOW GOOD IT WOULD BE IF WEAVERS EVERYWHERE COULD SHARE!

AN INTERESTING EXHIBIT OF HAND WEAVING IS BEING PRESENTED AT THE LEONARD LINN GALLERIES, 821 CHESTNUT COURT, WINNETKA, ILLINOIS, UNTIL AUGUST 30.

EMPHASIS IS PLACED ON CREATIVE WEAVING AS INSPIRED BY NATURE AND ART, WITH SOME MOST ATTRACTIVE WARP SEQUENCES BASED ON WOODS. STONES, ETC., BEAUTIFULLY MOUNTED SO THEIR EVOLUTION IS APPARENT TO THE UNTRAINED EYE. THERE WERE ALSO SOME INTERESTING MATS SHOWN MADE OF THIN STRIPS OF WOOD COM-BINED WITH VARIOUS YARNS. WERE PRESENTED BY STUDIO SAN DAMIANO, MILWAUKEE, WISCONSIN.

HER EXPERIENCE.


MATERIALS: SCRAP WOOD, 24" x 8"

4 TO 5" THICK
5/16" BRADS

MATERIALS FOR WEAVING

PREPARING THE LOOM:

HAMMER BRADS 5/16" APART ON THE TWO LONG SIDES AND ONE SHORT SIDE OF THE WOOD. SEE ILLUSTRATION:



MEASURE CORDS 6" LONGER THAN
THE DESIRED BELT LENGTH. TIE ONE
CORD ON EACH OF THE OUTSIDE BRADS
MARKED I AND 2 IN THE ILLUSTRATION. TIE FOUR CORDS ON EACH OF
THE OTHER BRADS ALONG THE SHORT
END OF THE BOARD LOOM.

DIRECTIONS FOR WEAVING:

FIRST ROW: PICK UP THE FIRST 2 WARP THREADS ON EACH SET OF 4, AND LIFT THEM HIGH ENOUGH TO PASS THE BALL OF WEFT THREAD BENEATH THEM. TIE THE WEFT TO THE TOP LEFT BRAD, MARKED I IN THE ILLUSTRATION. PASS THE BALL OF WEFT ALL THE WAY ACROSS AND ABOVE THE TOP BRAD ON THE RIGHT SIDE, MARKED 2 IN THE ILLUSTRATION. LOWER THE SEPARATED STRANDS.

SECOND ROW: SEPARATE OR OPEN
THE TWO TOP STRANDS WHICH ARE OVER
THE FIRST WEFT ROW. PICK UP THE
TWO LOWER STRANDS, BRINGING ONE
BETWEEN THE TWO WHICH WERE UP AND
ONE TO THE RIGHT OF THE TWO WHICH
WERE UP. THESE TWO LOWER STRANDS
ARE LAID BACK TO BECOME THE TOP
STRANDS OF THE SECOND ROW OF WEFT.
ALL OF THE WARP STRANDS ARE SEPARATED IN THIS MANNER.

BRING THE BALL OF WEFT AROUND THE FIRST NAIL ON THE RIGHT HAND SIDE AND TO THE LEFT SIDE OF THE LOOM, GOING OVER THE SECOND NAIL ON THE LEFT HAND SIDE.

THIRD AND SUCCEDING ROWS:
CONTINUE AS FOR SECOND ROW, REVERSING THE THREADS PULLED UP IN
THE WARP AND THE DIRECTION OF THE
BALL OF WEFT, MOVING DOWN ONE BRAD
WITH EACH ROW.

WHEN THE LAST BRAD IS REACHED, THE WOVEN PIECE MAY BE SLIPPED OFF AND MOVED TO THE TOP OF THE LOOM BY PUTTING THE LAST TWO SIDE LOOPS OVER THE TWO TOP BRADS. THESE STEPS ARE CONTINUED UNTIL THE PRO-PER LENGTH IS REACHED.

SEWING ON THE BUCKLE:

A BUCKLE MAY BE MOUNTED BY BRINGING THE ENDS OF THE WARP THROUGH THE BUCKLE, CLIPPING THE ENDS EVENLY, AND COVERING WITH A SMALL PIECE OF MATERIAL. STITCH ON WRONG SIDE, MAKING CERTAIN THAT ALL YARN ENDS ARE SECURELY SEWN.

FOR THE TINY TOTS WEAVING WITHOUT EQUIPMENT

HERE IS A METHOD OF WEAVING A BRAID WITHOUT ANY EQUIPMENT WHAT-SOEVER, AND IT IS A FINE GAME FOR TWO SMALL CHILDREN:

THE FINGERS OF ONE SMALL WORKER FORM THE LOOM, WHILE THE OTHER WEAVER PASSES THE SHUTTLE, A BRAID OF HORIZONTAL STRIPES OF RED AND BLUE IS MADE AS FOLLOWS:

FOUR RED THREADS ARE TIED WITH SLIP KNOTS, ONE TO EACH FINGER OF THE HAND. THE OTHER ENDS OF THE THREADS ARE TIED TOGETHER AND AT-TACHED TO A STRING TIED AROUND THE WAIST OF THE OTHER WORKER, BLUE THREADS ARE FASTENED TO THE FINGERS OF THE OTHER HAND IN THE SAME MANNER. THE FIRST WORKER CROSSES THE FINGERS OF THE TWO HANDS, MAKING A SHED THROUGH WHICH THE SHUTTLE IS PASSED BY THE WEAVER. THE FINGERS ARE THEN UN-CROSSED AND ANOTHER PASS OF THE SHUTTLE IS MADE. THE TWO MOVE-MENTS ARE REPEATED, AND THE BRAID IS VERY QUICKLY PRODUCED.

SILAS SAYS:

A FORMER SIDELINE OF HAND LOOM WEAVERS WAS THE MANUFACTURE OF "COACH LACE" WHICH WAS IN REALITY AN ORNAMENTAL BRAID USED TO ADORN COACHES! INTERIORS. SUCH AN EN-TERPRISE WAS USUALLY AN INDIVIDUAL VENTURE DONE IN THE HOME OF THE WEAVER. OCCASIONALLY SUCH CRAFTS-MEN KEPT COMPLETE ACCOUNTS OF THEIR BUSINESSES, INCLUDING SAM-PLE CARDS, DIRECTIONS, DYE RECIPES, AND OTHER DATA WHICH MAKES FOR FASCINATING READING TO MODERN WEAVERS, WHO AFTER ALL, FACE THE SAME IDENTICAL PROBLEMS.

BOOK REVIEW

AS OUR THEME THIS MONTH IS
"WEAVING FOR CHILDREN", IT SEEMS
ESPECIALLY APT FOR US TO REVIEW
WEAVING YOU CAN DO BY ELIZABETH
ALLEN. THIS IS A LITTLE BOOK
WHICH COVERS MANY TYPES OF WEAVING EASILY ADAPTED TO THE NEEDS
OF LESS CAPABLE HANDS.

DIRECTIONS ARE INCLUDED FOR A FRAME OR BOARD LOOM, FOR BEAD WEAVING, CARD WEAVING, AND INKLE LOOM WEAVING, ANY OF WHICH WOULD BE INTERESTING POSSIBILITIES FOR THE YOUNG FRY. THE ILLUSTRATIONS ARE CLEAR AND EASY TO FOLLOW, AND EXCEPT IN CASES OF COMPLICATED WEAVES, DISCUSSION GOES INTO SUFFICIENT DETAIL FOR THE AVERAGE BEGINNER.

THE BOOK IS NOT DESIGNED ES-PECIALLY FOR USE WITH CHILDREN. AND MUCH OF IT IS MORE COMPLI-CATED. THE DESIGNS AND OPERATING MECHANISMS OF ALL COMPLICATED LOOMS ARE SHOWN IN PHOTOGRAPHS AND DIAGRAMS WHICH GIVE NOT ONLY THE THREADING AND MANIPULATION PROCESSES BUT DEMONSTRATE SHED COMBINATIONS POSSIBLE IN EVERY POSITION OF THE FRAMES. THIS PARTICULAR POINT, VERY CLEARLY SHOWN, IS ONE MOST FREQUENTLY IG-NORED IN WEAVING BOOKS. THOR GOES ON TO DISCUSS YARN SE-LECTION, WINDING, AND MOUNTING IN PREPARATION FOR THREADING: THREAD-ING AND TREADLING PROBLEMS; FABRIC DESIGNING AND LAYING OUT; WARP AND WEFT VARIATIONS. MAKING KNOTS AND LOOPS AND PUTTING IN EXTRA THREADS ARE DISCUSSED IN RELATION TO TAPESTRY WEAVING. PATTERN READING AND MAKING OF DRAFTS IS CLEARLY DEMONSTRATED.

"I HAVE A LITTLE BOY OF TWO,
AND I WOULD LIKE TO WEAVE SOMETHING FOR HIM. HE DOESN'T NEED
BIBS, AND SO MANY OTHER THINGS

I WONDER IF YOU HAVE SEEN THE NEW "PINT SIZE PONCHOS"? THESE SEEM ESPECIALLY WELL ADAPTED TO USE OF HAND WOVEN FABRIC. AND FIT THE NEEDS OF BOYS EVERY BIT AS WELL AS GIRLS. ANOTHER ADVANTAGE IS THAT THEY CAN BE WOVEN ON A NAR-ROW LOOM. A SIZE TWO PONCHO WOULD TAKE ABOUT A YARD OF MATER-IAL, 15" TO 18" WIDE, DEPENDING ON THE BUILD OF THE CHILD. THE MATERIAL IS FOLDED IN HALF THE SHORT WAY OF THE MATERIAL, AND AN OPENING IS MADE IN THE CENTER FOR THE HEAD. THE NECK OPENING IS BOUND WITH CONTRASTING TAPE OR NEATLY HEMMED. THE ONLY OTHER RE-QUIRED SEWING IS TO FASTEN TIES ON EACH SIDE AT THE WAIST LINE. A DRAWSTRING MAY BE PUT IN AT THE WAIST IF DESIRED, BUT THE BOYS USUALLY PREFER THEIRS PLAIN. BOT-TOM AND SIDES MAY BE HEMMED OR BOUND IF DESIRED, THOUGH THE SEL-VAGES MAY BE LEFT PLAIN AND THE BOTTOM FRINGED. THESE ARE USUALLY QUITE SHORT, NO MORE THAN MIDWAY BETWEEN KNEE AND WAIST, AND ARE WORN OVER VERY BRIEF DARK COTTON PANTS.

AS PONCHOS ORIGINATE IN MEXICO
IT WOULD BE FITTING TO WEAVE THEM
IN BRILLIANT HORIZONTAL STRIPES,
OR A PLAIN MATERIAL WITH STRIPED
BORDER. BEWARE OF TOO FANCY A PATTERN, EVEN IN THE WEAVING, FOR THE
BOYS WEAR, AND REMEMBER TO USE
LIGHTWEIGHT THREAD, SO THE FINISHED
MATERIAL WILL BE SOFT AND COMFORTABLE IN HOT WEATHER.


