EXCITING NEWS! AS MANY OF OUR LONG TERM READERS KNOW, WE HAVE FOR YEARS BEEN WORKING TOWARD TWO GREAT ACCOMPLISHMENTS. FIRST, WE WANT TO GIVE YOU A GOOD WEAVING MAGAZINE, ONE WHICH IS HELPFUL AND INEXPENSIVE AND EASY TO READ. THAT BRINGS US TO OUR SECOND GOAL TO MAKE WARP & WEFT EASY TO READ. WE HAVE WORKED TOWARD HAVING IT PRINTED FOR THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS AND FINALLY THESE EFFORTS HAVE PAID OFF. THE VERY NEXT ISSUE, DECEMBER, 1953 WILL BE THE FIRST PRINTED ISSUE OF WARP & WEFT.

THE CONTENTS WILL REMAIN THE SAME, ALTHOUGH THE OUTSIDE MEAS—UREMENTS OF THE PAGES THEMSELVES WILL BE SMALLER. IN THIS MORE COMPACT SHAPE IT WILL BE MORE EASILY MAILED TO YOU AND MORE EASILY FILED BY YOU.

AS ALL OF YOU KNOW, POSTAL RATES HAVE RISEN AND ARE DUE FOR ANOTHER RISE. FOR THIS REASON, WHETHER OR NOT WE WENT INTO A PRINTED MEDIUM, OUR RATES, ALWAYS THE LOWEST ON THE MARKET, WOULD HAVE TO BE RAISED. BY DINT OF MUCH EFFORT AND FIGURING WE ARE MANAGING TO PAY THE NEW POSTAGE RATES AND THE NEW PRINTING AT AN INCREASE OF ONLY 50¢ PER YEAR. THIS RATE INCREASE WILL BE EFFECT-IVE JANUARY 1, 1954. YOU HAVE UN-SCRIPTION OR SEND IN THOSE GIFT SUBSCRIPTIONS AT THE OLD PRICE OF \$2 PER YEAR. YOU MAY RENEW YOUR PER YEAR.

SUBSCRIPTIONS AT THE OLD PRICE OF \$2 PER YEAR REGARDLESS OF THE EXPIRATION DATE OF YOUR CURRENT SUBSCRIPTION, AND YOU MAY RENEW NOW FOR AS MANY YEARS AS YOU WISH BEFORE THIS RAISE IN PRICE. SEND IN THE ENCLOSED SLIP AT ONCE WITH THE RENEWAL FEE OF \$2 PER YEAR. IMAGINE, A PRINTED MAGAZINE, WITH AN ACTUAL SPECIALLY DESIGNED SAMPLE, AT ONLY \$2, AFTER JANUARY 1, 1954, THE PRICE WILL BE \$2.50.

IT IS ANNOUNCED THAT AS OF OCTOBER 20, 1953, MR. AND MRS. MARTIN TIDBALL AND THE SHUTTLE CRAFT GUILD ARE MOVING FROM VIRGINIA CITY, MONTANA TO KELSEY-VILLE, CALIFORNIA. THERE IS NO CHANGE IN THE REGULAR BUSINESS OF THE SHUTTLE CRAFT GUILD EXCEPT THAT YARN SALES WILL BE DISCON-TINUED.

AN ATTEMPT IS BEING MADE TO ORGANIZE A WEAVERS GUILD IN THE VICINITY OF GRAND RAPIDS, MICH. ALL INTERESTED WEAVERS—AND ALL WEAVERS ARE INVITED—ARE REQUESTED TO CONTACT MRS. D. D. TOBIAS, 256 BALTIMORE DRIVE, GRAND RAPIDS 6, MICH. HALF THE FUN OF WEAVING IS PARTICIPATION IN THE EXPERIENCES OF OTHER WEAVERS, SO WE EXPECT TO HEAR MORE OF THE ACTIVITIES OF THIS GROUP IN THE NOT TOO DISTANT FUTURE.



MAKING YOUR CHRISTMAS CARD:

WE THINK THE WEFT YARNS WE USED IN THIS MONTH'S SAMPLE ARE ESPECIALLY NICE AND SOME WHICH YOU WILL WANT TO USE IN A VARIETY THEY ARE FLAT 1/64 MET-OF WAYS. ALLIC, PLASTIC, SUPPORTED WITH NYLON DYED THE SAME COLOR AS THE METALLIC. THE DYE JOB IS SO EX-CELLENT THAT THE NYLON IS PRACT-ICALLY INVISIBLE BUT IT IS STILL THERE TO GIVE THE DESIRED SUPPORT. IT IS AVAILABLE IN TWO SHADES OF PINK, TWO SHADES OF BLUE, TWO SHADES OF GREEN, RED, COPPER, GOLD, AND SILVER. IT IS SMOOTH AND WORKS OUT VERY WELL. ARE 350 YARDS PER SPOOL AND THEY SELL FOR \$ EACH. THE MULTICOL-ORED METALLIC IS ACTUALLY FIVE OR SIX COLORS OF FINE METALLIC BRAID-ED TOGETHER, WITH THE FINAL EFFECT MOSTLY OF SILVER WITH SPECKS OF THE OTHER COLORS. IT IS VERY LOVELY, BUT SOMEWHAT HEAVIER THAN THE OTHERS DESCRIBED ABOVE. THE MULTICOLORED BRAID IS \$1.25 PER SPOOL. ALL OF THESE MATERIALS ARE AVAILABLE AT ROBIN & RUSS HANDWEAVERS, 10 W. ANAPAMU ST., SANTA BARBARA, CALIFORNIA. TRY THEM, WE KNOW YOU WILL LIKE THEM.

THIS MATERIAL USED FOR OUR TINY CHRISTMAS TREES, WAS VERY BEAUTIFUL IN THE PIECE. THE BROWN OF THE TRUNKS GAVE A NOT TOO OB-VIOUS WARP STRIPE, AND THE RANDOM CHANGES OF COLOR IN THE WEFT WERE VERY LOVELY. WE WOULD LIKE TO SEE THIS IN A LARGE PIECE USED FOR A WALL HANGING DECORATION DURING THE IT WOULD ALSO BE VERY HOLIDAYS. LOVELY FOR AN EVENING JACKET. COURSE ANY SINGLE COLOR COULD BE EMPHASIZED IF PREFERRED. IF YOU ARE ONE OF THOSE LUCKY CREATURES WHO HAS BOTH THE OCCASION TO WEAR AN EVENING SHEATH AND THE FIGURE ON WHICH TO PUT IT, THIS WOULD MAKE A MOST DRAMATIC SHEATH FOR AN EVENING GOWN. IF YOU USE IT IN THIS WAY, DRESS DOWN THE ACCESSOR-TES--BLACK VELVET WOULD PROBABLY BE YOUR BEST CHOICE.

WE SUGGEST THAT THE FIRST STEP IN MAKING THIS CARD IS TO SEE WHAT YOUR STATIONER OR PRINT-ER HAS AVAILABLE IN THE FORM OF SMALL ENVELOPES. SO MANY PEOPLE ARE MAKING THEIR OWN CARDS NOW-ADAYS THAT WE HAVE FOUND THAT THE STORES ARE CARRYING A BETTER LINE OF PLAIN CARDS AND ENVELOPES. SOMETIMES IT IS POSSIBLE TO BUY PLAIN WHITE SINGLE OR FOLDED CARDS WITH MATCHING ENVELOPES. IF YOU CAN'T FIND THESE, BUY THE ENVELOPES AND CUT A SIZE OF COL-ORED PAPER TO FIT EITHER PLAIN OR FOLDED. WE LIKED THE APPEAR-ANCE OF THE FOLDED ONE BETTER. METALLIC PAPER WOULD LOOK WELL, BUT COLORED CONSTRUCTION PAPER DOES VERY WELL, LESS EXPENSIVELY. THE WORDING CAN BE YOUR OWN IF YOU DO NOT WISH TO FOLLOW OUR SIMPLE SUGGESTION. THE LINES FOR THE TREE TRUNK AND BASE ARE EASY TO DO WITH PEN AND INK, AL-THOUGH THOSE OF YOU NEAR A LARGE ART STORE MIGHT FIND A COLORED SEAL WHICH WOU'LD DO WELL FOR THE BASE. ON COLORED PAPER, WHITE INK LOOKS VERY WELL FOR THE LET-TERING AND LINES, BUT OF COURSE YOU MAY HAVE SOME OTHER IDEA FOR AN ORIGINAL COLOR SCHEME. IS THE BEST WAY TO CUT THE TREES TO ADVANTAGE:



YOU WILL NOTICE THAT IN DOING
THIS HALF THE TREES HAVE THE
BROWN STRIPE DOWN THE CENTER; THE
OTHER HALF THE BROWN TIPS ON THE
OUTER MOST BRANCHES, WHICH IS ALL
RIGHT IN EITHER CASE. IF PREFERRED, THE BROWN STRIPE MIGHT BE
OMITTED ENTIRELY, BUT WE LIKED
IT. IF THE EDGES FRAY SLIGHTLY
IT ADDS TO THE EFFECT. FASTEN
THE TREE TO THE CARD WITH A METALLIC STAR, WRITE YOUR MESSAGE,
AND PLEASE YOUR FRIENDS. (PAGE 2)

RED METALLIC WOUND WITH TWO STRANDS
OF GREEN COTTON SEWING THREAD
PINK METALLIC AND GREEN COTTON
WOUND TOGETHER AS ABOVE
BLUE METALLIC AND GREEN COTTON
WOUND TOGETHER AS ABOVE
COPPER METALLIC WOUND WITH ONE
STRAND BROWN COTTON
MULTICOLOR METALLIC USED ALONE
2 STRANDS GREEN COTTON SEWING
THREAD USED TOGETHER

\*\*ENGLAND: THE ROYAL SOCIETY OF ARTS ARE OFFERING MONETARY PRIZES OF CONSIDERABLE VALUE IN THIS YEAR'S INDUSTRIAL ART BURSARIES COMPETITION, THE PRIZES TAKE THE FORM OF MONEY FOR TRAVEL AND ARE OPEN TO STUDENTS INTENDING TO TAKE UP INDUSTRIAL DESIGNING AS A CAREER.

MANY WHO SAW THE KING AND 1 COMMENTED ON THE BEAUTY OF THE SOME OF THOSE LOVELY COSTUMES. SILKS ARE COMING INTO AMERICA, AND THE STORY OF THIS ACCOMPLISH-MENT IS AN INTERESTING ONE. SIAM, OR THAILAND AS IT IS NOW CALLED, HAS FOR CENTURIES BEEN A COUNTRY IN WHICH MUCH OF THE INTERNAL ECONOMY DEPENDS ON WOVEN SILK FAB-FOLLOWING THE WAR THERE WERE HAND LOOMS IDLE EVERYWHERE AND WEAVERS WHO HAD NO OUTLET FOR AN ENTERPRISING THEIR GOODS. AMERICAN WHO HAD SEEN WAR SERVICE IN THAILAND MADE AN ENDEAVOR TO ORGANIZE THESE WEAVERS WITHIN THE SCOPE OF EXISTING CONDITIONS AND HELP TO BRING SOME STABILITY AND POSSIBLE PROSPERITY TO THIS SECT-ION OF THE POPULATION. THE AT-TEMPT HAS PROVEN HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL AND THE ECONOMIC COMMISSION OF THE UNITED NATIONS REPORTED THAT SIX FACTORS HAD TO DO WITH THIS SUCCESS:

LOCAL EQUIPMENT FOR WEAVING AND SPINNING WAS USED, THEREBY EL-IMINATING THE NEED FOR LARGE OUT-LAY OF CAPITAL.

THERE WAS CONCENTRATION ON FABRICS USING LOCAL MATERIALS, WHICH HELPED TO KEEP PRODUCTION COSTS DOWN AND RESULTED IN A PRODUCT ENTIRELY UNLIKE OTHERS ON THE MARKEE.

STANDARDS WERE SET HIGH AND HELD TO THE ORIGINAL OF THE TERRI-TORY. DESIGNS, COLORS, OR WEAVES WERE NOT COPIED FROM ELSEWHERE.

BECAUSE A GREAT PART OF THE EXPORT BUSINESS DEPENDS ON SAMP-LES, UNIFORMITY AND FASTNESS OF DYEING WAS EMPHASIZED.

BY DEVELOPING A LOCAL AND EX-PORT MARKET A STEADY OUTLET WAS ASSURED.

IMPROVED METHODS OF PRODUCT-ION ALLOWED FOR STANDARDIZATION OF FINISHED PRODUCT. WE KNOW FROM THE NUMBER OF QUESTIONS SENT IN TO THE EDITOR, THAT A FAVORITE PROJECT FOR THE HAND WEAVER IS THE MAKING OF A GIFT FOR THE CHURCH. THESE ARE MADE BY WEAVERS EVERYWHERE, OF ALL DENOMINATIONS. ALTAR CLOTHS, HANGINGS AND VESTMENTS ARE THE FAVORITE PROJECTS, AND THE CRAFT-SMANSHIP SHOWN IS REMARKABLE IN MANY INSTANCES.

LINEN ALTAR CLOTHS WITH LAID
IN MOTIFS OF RELIGIOUS SIGNIFICANCE ARE PROBABLY THE FAVORITE
OF THIS TYPE OF PROJECT. WE
HAVE SEEN THESE BOTH OF ALL LINEN
WITH LACE DECORATIONS, OR LINEN.
SILK, RAYON, WOOL, OR A COMBINATION OF THESE WITH LACE WOVEN IN
OR WITH DESIGNS LAID IN OF METALLICS OR COLORS. SILVER AND
GOLD ARE THE MOST FREQUENTLY
USED BECAUSE IT CAN BE MADE TO
MATCH OTHER ALTAR ACCESSORIES.
SOME CHURCHES LIKE THE TONE OF
COPPER, ESPECIALLY IF THE RUG,
FOR INSTANCE, IS RED BECAUSE IT
HAS A WARMTH LACKING IN BOTH
GOLD AND SILVER.

ONE WEAVER RECENTLY WOVE A
HANGING TO FILL THE SPACE BEHIND
THE ALTAR IN A PROTESTANT CHURCH.
THIS PARTICULAR CHURCH WAS A
SMALL ONE, NOT ORNATE IN ANY WAY,
AND IT WAS FELT AT FIRST THAT ANY
METALLIC MIGHT BE TOO TOO MUCH.
HOWEVER, WHEN SAMPLES WERE PUT
IN PLACE THERE WAS A UNANIMOUS
CHOICE FOR A DARK WARM REDDISH
TONE DRAPE OF COTTON AND WOOL,
WITH SMALL ALMOST HIDDEN TOUCHES
OF COPPER. IT SOUNDS VERY MODERN
FOR A SMALL TRADITIONAL CHURCH
BUT THE FINAL EFFECT WAS LOVELY
AND NOT AT ALL INCONGRUOUS.

WE HAVE SEEN THE INTERIORS
OF TWO BEAUTIFUL JEWISH SYNAGOGUES RECENTLY IN WHICH HAND WEAVING WAS USED FOR THE INTERIOR
DECORATION. IN ONE THE ENTIRE
THEME OF THE ROOM WAS BEIGE AND
GOLD, AND THE DRAPERY MADE AN
EXCELLENT BACKGROUND FOR THE
RICHNESS OF THE OTHER FURNISHINGS. IN THE OTHER, THE CURIAIN
WAS MADE OF WOOL CARPETING, DECORATED WITH SYMBOLIC DESIGNS
MADE OF COLORED WOOL AND METALLIC, WORKED IN A TECHNIQUE SIMILAR TO RUG HOOKING, WITH SOME OF
THE LOOPS SHEARED.

WE FEEL OFTEN THAT THE POSSIBILITIES OF THE SIMPLEST THREADINGS ARE NOT FULLY ENOUGH EXPLORED, 30 WE WERE DELIGHTED TO RECEIVE TN THE MAIL RECENTLY A NEW
LITTLE BOOK TITLED FOUR HARNESS
HUCK. THE AUTHOR, EVELYN NEHER,
IS A LONG TIME WARP & WEFT SUBSCRIBER, AND WE THINK THAT MANY
OF OUR READERS COULD GET MUCH HELP
FROM THIS LITTLE BOOK. IT IS PAPER BOUND, 42 PAGES CONTAINING
OVER 100 PHOTOS.

THE BOOK OPENS WITH A SHORT
HISTORY OF THE TERM HUCK, AND A
DISCUSSION OF THE CHARACTERISTICS
AND STRUCTURE OF THIS WEAVE.
FOLLOWING IS A COLLECTION OF HUCK
THREADING DRAFTS AND A COMPLETE
DESCRIPTION OF THE WEAVING THEOR—
IES INVOLVED. GENERAL DIRECTIONS
FOR WEAVING WEFT FACED SPOTS,
WARP FACED SPOTS, TURNED SPOTS
(THOSE INVOLVING BOTH WARP & WEFT)
DOUBLE AND TRIPLE HUCK DESIGNS
ARE INCLUDED.

PHOTOGRAPHS, THREADING, DRAFTS, AND TREADLING FOLLOW FOR ALL OVER HUCK SPOTS, THE COMBI-NATION OF HUCK WITH PLAIN WEAVE, AND REED PATTERNED HUCK WITH WHICH SOME INTERESTING AND QUICKLY WOVEN LACE EFFECTS CAN BE PRODUCED. THE BOOK CLOSES WITH ILLUSTRATIONS OF DOUBLE THREAD HUCK AND COLOR AND TEXTURE DESIGN IN THIS TECH-IN SUMMARY ARE SOME SUG-NIQUE. GESTIONS FOR WEAVING A SAMPLES BASED ON THE HUCK THEORY. THERE IS ALSO INCLUDED A COMPLETE BIB-LIOGRAPHY FOR HUCK REFERENCE WHICH YOU WILL FIND HELPFUL. THIS BOOK MAY PROVE TO BE JUST THE THING YOUR STUDY GROUP IS SEARCHING FOR; IT COULD WELL BE USED AS A TEXT AND GUIDEBOOK FOR SUCH A GROUP.

ANGORA IS A LUXURY FIBER, OBTAINED FROM THE ANGORA RABBIT. IT IS LUXURIOUS NOT ONLY BECAUSE OF ITS COST AND PLEASANT SOFT FEEL BUT ALSO BECAUSE IT MUST BE HANDLED WITH UTMOST CARE AT ALL TIMES. THERE IS NO WAY TO STOP OR ARREST THE SHEDDING OF FIBERS FROM ANY ALL-ANGORA FABRIC, OR EVEN FROM ONE CONTAINING A LARGE PERCENTAGE OF ANGORA YARNS. MANY WEARERS, HOWEVER, REGARD THIS DISADVANTAGE AS UNIMPORTANT WHEN THE BEAUTY, HIGH STYLE, AND PLEASANT HAND ARE TAKEN INTO CON-SIDERATION.

THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF CLEANING AND DYEING ADVISE THAT ALL OR PART ANGORA ARTICLES SHOULD BE DRY CLEANED, AND THAT EVEN THEN THEY SHOULD HAVE SPEC-IAL AND CAREFUL HANDLING. THE PHYSICAL STRUCTURE OF THE FIBER IS SUCH THAT IT WILL FELT VERY EASILY-BY FELTING WE MEAN BECOME HARSH AND HARD WITH THE SLIGHTEST MECHANICAL ACTION. YOU SHOULD THEREFORE ENTRUST THIS SCARF TO ONLY THE VERY MOST CAPABLE AND RELIABLE CLEANER.
